Brain Walk

What is Brain Walk?

Brain Walk is an interactive tool that walks through the brain to help students from kindergarten through grade six learn about the different functions of the brain and about how to keep their brain safe and healthy.

Brain Walk engages participants with interactive questions, displays, demonstrations, and hands on activities. Students are divided into small groups of 5 or 6 and proceed through 10 stations.

Time

The time required for Brain Walk depends on the number of students involved. It takes approximately 70 minutes for a group of 60 students to fully experience Brain Walk. Close to 240 students can participate in a full school day.
