



Regional Coordinators

There are five ABI Coordinators with the Saskatchewan Health Authority, situated throughout the province. They are located in the communities of Swift Current, Moose Jaw, Weyburn, Yorkton, and Lloydminster and provide client service within the boundaries of their respective former health regions.

The Coordinators engage in community development and case management activities to facilitate effective community reintegration of individuals with ABI.

The ABI Coordinators work to bridge the gap in service between acute care/rehabilitation and the community. They assist the survivor through the reintegration process while focusing ultimately on an optimal quality of life for the survivor and the family. The ABI Coordinators' functions fall within three main areas: identifying, co-ordinating and supporting community programs and resources that meet the individual needs of the ABI survivor; family support and education; and identifying and supporting appropriate residential options. In order to implement individualized care plans community development is a central role of the ABI Coordinators. The ABI Coordinators also facilitate education and training of other human service providers.

COMMUNITY INTEGRATION FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Radius Community Centre for Education & Employment Training, Saskatoon

Community Integration for Children, Youth and Young Adults

The Community Integration Service (CIS) provides transitional community integration support through meaningful social and recreational experiences in the client's community. The support is intended for school age children and youth, including young adults up to 30 years of age, who are not in school and have a diagnosed moderate to severe ABI.

Client referrals are accepted from within the urban and rural boundaries of the three Saskatoon School Divisions, the city of Saskatoon or as required virtually when outside of the service area.

Participation with the service is voluntary and the social recreational support is typically provided during the client's free time such as evenings, weekends and during the summer.

Radius will work with the family and service providers to positively complement any existing services the client may be receiving.

There is no fee to access the services. Higher cost activities that are part of a client's goal may need to be paid for, but Radius can assist the family to explore additional funding opportunities. Radius is committed to building capacity, enhancing community services and collaborates with other local agencies and ABI Partnership programs to effectively deliver services for persons with an ABI.

- The program objectives include:
 - Improve community participation of individuals through positive social and recreation opportunities.
 - Develop a community integration plan based on client goals

- Support the family to help implement the plan
- Utilise existing community resources
- Advocate on behalf of the client or family to reduce barriers to participation

These services based on client goals are delivered in person or as required virtually through:

- The provision of a 1:1 community support worker that meets weekly with the client for community activities
- Weekly social recreational small groups that includes the:
 - Summer Fun Program –
 variety of individual or small
 group activities in July and
 August;
 - Sports for Life intended for older youth ages 18-30 years during fall and spring;
 - Youth Art Program in house or community art activities during fall and spring.

DAY AND EVENING PROGRAMMING

Lloydminster & Area Brain Injury Society (LABIS), Lloydminster Community-Based Life Enrichment Program

Participants who come to the Life Enrichment Program have many different and difficult issues to deal with. To be able to accept their injury and live a life of quality is quite a struggle. This program offers a place for them to come where they are accepted as they are, where they can grow in terms of self-acceptance and self-confidence. This four day per week program is designed to promote an independent lifestyle and consists of: exercise, mental aerobics, reality orientation, current events, basic life skills, crafts, games and cards, music, special guests, special events and field trips. Personal Support is offered to the participants on an individual basis, one day per week.

The agency serves individuals with traumatic, pathological and chronic brain injuries. Clients are referred to the Life Enrichment Program by their families and caregivers, other organizations and facilitates, social workers, or themselves. Clients will not be excluded based on time since injury, age, or co-morbid/concurrent conditions.

Saskatchewan Association for the Rehabilitation of the Brain Injured (SARBI)

Individual Rehabilitation & Life Enrichment Programming

There are SARBI programs in Saskatoon, Regina and Kelvington.

SARBI Saskatoon and Regina programs are designed to provide opportunities for survivors of ABI to re-learn and practice the social skills that were lost in their brain injury. SARBI does this by matching comparable groups (similar age, similar interests) of individuals and providing these small groups with directed social and recreational activities. During the summer, SARBI has community reintegration programs in Saskatoon and Regina. These programs give participants opportunities to enjoy community events and recreation in their city. SARBI also provides support to families and caregivers of survivors of ABI by helping connect them to other services and to each other.

East Central SARBI provides individually-designed rehabilitation programs and support to survivors of acquired brain injuries that reside within a 150 kilometre radius of Kelvington, SK. EC SARBI's program is open referral, meaning that anyone can make a referral, even the client themselves.

Client programming includes physical, speech and language, cognitive/memory, occupational and recreational therapies. Rehabilitation programs are designed and reviewed by Speech and Occupational therapists within the region. Volunteers, under the guidance of staff, professional therapists and consultants, play a central role in the rehabilitation services provided to the client. Our goal is to facilitate as much "quality of life" as possible for our clients.

SBIA strives to prevent brain injuries and to improve the lives of survivors and their families. It is a provincial grassroots organization founded in 1985 by family members to support survivors and families.

SBIA assists in developing networks for both survivors and family members which may provide a vehicle for interacting with individuals with similar issues and problems; decreasing the social isolation that families sometimes face after a family member incurs a brain injury; and offering social support during crisis periods.

Support groups for survivors as well as for caregivers operate in several communities. In addition, SBIA hosts three annual provincial events and holds weekly programs in major centres that include youth, walking and drumming groups.

The Association also produces and distributes educational materials and resources. SBIA promotes awareness of brain injury and its prevention through annual Brain Injury Awareness Month posters, materials and displays.

INDEPENDENT LIVING AND RESIDENTIAL

Phoenix Residential Society, Regina

PEARL Program - ABI Community Residential Service

Serving all of Saskatchewan

Phoenix Residential Society's PEARL Program is a supported apartment living program staffed on a 24-hour basis for ABI survivors requiring residential support. In addition, a supportive living program is provided for individuals who are living in a home of their choice, who do not require 24-hour in-house support services. The program's goal is to enable individuals with ABI to live more independently in the community by assisting in the restoration of as much functional ability and quality of life as possible.

Referrals are accepted from health care facilities, and other community agencies or programs and the ABI Outreach Teams. The person or family member living with ABI may also apply. Information about the program and an application form will be sent upon request. An Admissions Committee will review all referrals, determine the appropriateness of the referral and whether the ABI Program is able to meet the needs of the person referred given the current range of available residential options.

Eligibility Criteria:

- 1. Clients must have a diagnosis of an acquired brain injury. Persons with a congenital brain injury of one that is a result of a progressive condition will not be considered.
- 2. Clients must be medically stable, capable of managing medical challenges ie. Seizures, pain, etc., and must be independent with their physical needs.
- 3. Clients must be 18 years of age or older.
- 4. Appropriate financial arrangements must be established before admission.
- 5. Clients must be assessed to have the potential for independent living in the community and e able to benefit from rehabilitation services. Clients will be expected to have basic independent living skills.
- 6. Clients must demonstrate adequate impulse control so as not to threaten the welfare of others, seriously disrupt the program or cause major problems in the community.
- 7. Clients are expected to make a commitment to participate in the program. Clients must agree to work toward the goal of taking increased responsibility for learning new skills and strategies to improve their quality of life.
- 8. Clients deemed to have a Substance Use Disorder must agree to be involved in a treatment program prior to admission and maintain a period of sobriety.

We offer a continuum of client-centred pre-employment and employment readiness services designed to support participants throughout their employment journey. Programs and services are personalized for the client's abilities, skills, and interests and developed collaboratively. These may include vocational evaluation, employment exploration and decision making, resume and/or interview skills workshops, and understanding employer expectations, transferable skills, and, potentially, job development and ongoing coaching, maintenance services, and community referrals.

The ABI Supported Employment program strives to promote meaningful and equitable opportunities in our communities. By providing participants opportunities for vocational pursuits, improved employability skills, and an enhanced vocational support system; Supported Employment practices guide us to find the right job, at the right time with the right supports.
